Board Meeting, Thursday, August 2, 2012, 8:15 a.m. R.S.P. Convention, Renaissance Indianapolis North, Carmel, IN

The first board meeting was called to order at 8:15 a.m. President Allen DiMarco with Terry Coy former President, Bob Yaklin, nominating committee chairman, and all board members present. Allen welcomed everyone to the convention and meeting. The meeting convened at 8:15 am.

The secretary, Mary Lou Bougher read the minutes of the last meeting. A motion to accept the minutes as read was made by John Imboden with Walt Krzycki second. The motion was voted and passed.

The Treasurer's report was given by treasurer, Ken Bougher. Allen asked for any corrections or additions and having none, a motion was made to accept the report by Walt Krzycki and second by Paul Fischer.

Paul Fischer explained about the family problems the auctioneer has had for not getting out the brochures for the auction. His 4 year old granddaughter was diagnosed with leukemia. Brochures will be available Friday for the auction.

Bob Yaklin nominating committee reported that Allen Di Marco, Mary Lou Bougher and Ken Bougher have all agreed to run for a second term. Paul Fischer and Nadine Sidmore are not running for another term as Director and Vice President. Also Harold Dodds, Jr. is not able to run again as he has served two terms. Bob reported he had talked to Rich Habenicht and he had consented to run for the office of Vice President. David Mullins was suggested for the board. That leaves another position open as Director to fill during nominations. Allen Marcus, Beth Vander Meer and Larry Bazaar were also suggested as VP nominees.

Due to suggestion from the roundtable meeting, a motion was made by Harold Dodds, Jr. that the banquet be held on Friday night and the auction at 10 a.m. Saturday morning. Second by Nadine Sidmore. Voted and approved. On the website and hosting issue, Linda Titus said we have to renew our contract for web hosting. Ken Jinde, webmaster has said the software is not user-friendly and he would rather we find someone else to do it. Linda said the best thing to do would be to scrap the software we have now completely and start over. Linda suggested we announce about it in the general meeting. Linda will let us know by Saturday of the possibilities so the discussion was tabled until the Saturday Board meeting.

The convention in 2014 will be held in Grand Rapids, Michigan. The Michigan club has stayed there and liked it.

The secretary reported that the feedback has been positive on having the registration in their room. Much more convenient for the secretary and treasurer as well as for the members.

Mary Lou gave a "State of the Union" report on membership and convention details. Motion by Nadine to accept as read and 2nd by John Imboden. Voted and approved.

Mary Lou made a motion the club purchase a t-shirt with pugs on it as a thank you gift for David Mullins for starting the Facebook page which has been a real success. 2nd by Harold Dodds, Jr.,voted and approved.

John Imboden reported the Ohio Club has approximately \$2000.00 in their treasury they would like to donate to the club. We held a discussion on the matter and John will get us a cashier's check. The money will be in the general treasury and be used by the club when needed as per the board's discretion.

Mary Lou Bougher made a motion the club purchase and award gold foiled certificates to the charter member with 26 or 27 years of membership and in addition, award certificates to 25 year continuous members. 2nd, by Walt Krzycki. Under our constitution, members joining before September 1, 1986 are to be known as charter members. We held a discussion and the motion was voted on and approved. Certificates will be awarded at the business meeting. Out of approximately 50 charter members, 27 are still active in the club. Those charter members who could not attend convention will have their certificates sent to them.

Walt Krzycki reports several members had approached him about having the mugs again. Linda said they were discontinued for lack of interest and cost of having to purchase half a gross of mugs. The item was tabled until the 2nd Board meeting. Linda will check on the possibility of purchasing smaller quantities of mugs.

Paul Fischer announced we will have a piano player for the banquet who will take requests. She is not charging us but there will be a tip jar.

25 year certificates were given to those who had achieved 25 years of continuous membership but were not Charter Members. Honorees were Inez Smith, Mary and Arlo Stender, and Andrea and Dale Rothrock.

Honored for 25 years but unable to attend were Ross Taylor, Margaret and Jerry Drysdale, Judy Otero, Elizabeth Hardy, Their certificates will be sent to them.

Minutes of the 2011 convention business meeting were read by Mary Lou Bougher, Secretary. A motion for acceptance for the minutes as read was made by John Imboden, 2nd by Walt Krzycki. A vote was taken and motion





passed.

Mary Lou gave a "State of the Union" report telling us that to date we have 233 U.S. members and 9 Non-US members for a total of 242 members. Last year we had 256 members for a net loss of 7 members. A special thanks goes to Jim and Laurie Wroda for paying for 7 first time memberships. He offered to pay any first time members fee for those attending one of his Prussia auctions. So far we have gained 16 new members since the last convention. We have 71 families preregistered for convention and have 91 families registered at the hotel.

The Treasurer's report was given by Ken Bougher. He reported we had income of \$22, 063.37 and expenses of \$17, 282.71. This made a net increase in the Treasury of \$4280.66. A call was made for any corrections or additions and since there were no corrections or additions, Walt Krzycki made a motion the minutes be approved as read. 2nd by Paul Fischer. Voted and approved.

Bob Yaklin gave a report from the Nominating Committee. He reported Allen DiMarco, Ken and Mary Lou Bougher and Judy Bazaar all agreed to run for a second term. Paul Fischer and Nadine Sidmore declined to run for a second term. Allen DiMarco was nominated for President by Harold



Dodds, 2nd by Larry Bazaar. Mary Lou Bougher was nominated for Secretary by Nash Hayes and 2nd by Larry Bazaar. Ken Bougher was nominated for Treasurer by Carl Tackett and 2nd by Bob McCaslin.

Rich Habenicht was nominated for the position of Vice President by Terry Coy, 2nd by Selma Greenberg. Selma Greenberg. Linda Gray was nominated for the board by Harold Dodds Jr. 2nd by Ken Bougher. A call for other nominations from the floor was made and David Mullins was nominated for an open board seat by Harold Dodds, Jr., 2nd by Arlo Stender. Beth Vander Meer was nominated for Vice President by Paul Fischer and 2nd by Selma Greenberg. Larry Bazaar was nominated for Vice President by Mary Lou Bougher and 2nd by Andrea Rothrock. Motion made by Howard Greenberg that the nominations be closed. 2nd by Beth Vander Meer. Voted and approved. Since Allen DiMarco, Ken Bougher, Mary Lou Bougher, Judy Bazaar, Linda Gray and David Mullins had no one opposing them, a motion for election by acclimation was made by Annette Hite and 2nd by Carl Tackett. Voted and elected by acclimation. Ballots to vote on the Vice President's position were passed out, filled out and collected. Rich Habenicht was elected Vice President.

Allen announced the hospitality room was open and volunteers to help staff it should speak to the Hiatts. He thanked the Hiatts for manning the hospitality room and all those who have brought in goodies.



Howard Greenberg reported the Do-It-Yourself auction will be held and asked members for donations of items to be auctioned. This is a big moneymaker for the club. We have raised just over \$50,000 since we started it.

Bob Welter reminded everyone to get their tickets for the 50/50 raffle. Half of the money raised will go to the winner and half to the club. Tickets sales are going well.

Nadine announced the room to room viewing schedule.

Convention sites for the 2013 and 2014 conventions were announced. Grand Rapids, Michigan, 2013 and St. Louis, Missouri, 2014.

Allen thanked Dannie and Paul for recruiting the entertainment for the banquet. We will have a piano player who will play all types of music and will take requests. She is not charging the club but will have a tip jar so be generous.

Carl Tackett gave a report on behalf of himself and Ed Smith that they had audited the Treasurer's books and they were in order.

Newsletter Editor Linda Titus explained why the newsletters can sometimes be late. They are delayed if she doesn't have enough to put into them. Anyone can write a short article on their first piece, an unusual piece they found, or how they acquired a particular piece. They could write about an auction or show they attended or many other subjects. Linda and her assistant Heather would be glad to edit it and get it ready for the newsletter if they needed help.

Allen explained how we are charged

by the hotel for the convention. We get credit for all banquet meals purchased less taxes and gratuity. This pays for the auction and meeting rooms and if we do not meet that minimum, we are charged the difference. We also have a quota of nights to meet or we would face a very large fine as we did a few years ago. Members are asked to please register under the RSP club rooms so we get credit for their room nights.

Bob McCaslin suggested we lower dues to \$25.00 to attract and hold new members. It was explained that the newsletters and roster cost the club more than the \$50.00 membership fee. The club could not afford the more than \$6000.00 per year it would cost us to reduce the dues to half price. The idea was dropped after a discussion.

Paul Fischer explained the auctioneer's granddaughter had been diagnosed with leukemia and that is why there were no brochures prior to the convention but that brochures were available in the hospitality room and in the auction room.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Harold Dodds and 2nd by Ken Bougher. Voted and approved. The meeting was adjourned.

# The Travails of an R.S. Prussia Collector Submitted by Arlo Stender

y story starts out with a cow with claustrophobia. One day we caught the herd for the veterinarian to do his work. I suddenly remember that one of the cows had jumped out of the corral last year. We soon knew which one she was by her nervous demeanor. She pushed against a swinging gate and pinned my grandnephew between it and another fence. It looked like he might have a broken arm. I jumped up on the corral opposite from the cow. The cow jumped over a panel opposite me. My nephew removed his son from the situation. The veterinarian attempted to let the cow loose and the cow lunged at me still on the fence. I was knocked off of the corral and thought the cow was going to come on over and land on me.

My nephew took his son to the hospital. Evidently I told everyone I would be alright, but the veterinarian, his assistant, and my grandson realized that I was not alright physically or mentally. I was in pain and confused. My sisterin-law who lives on this farm took me and we went to town to get my wife and head to the hospital which was another twenty miles away.

We were getting closer to the hospital and I still had no memory. My wife tried to jog my memory by telling me that we are going to California. I said, "no we aren't, we can't afford to." She said, "yes we are and I am selling the R.S. Prussia." I say "no we are not selling the R.S. Prussia".

I credit R.S. Prussia for bringing back my memory though I still do not remember the time between the fall and the mention of R.S. Prussia. And now (as Paul Harvey used to say) for the rest of the story...

My grandnephew didn't have a broken arm, only bruising. The cow jumped out of the corral, but not onto me. I suffered a concussion and a compression fracture in a lower lumbar. I was told that I went off the corral fence backwards at a height of eight feet. After almost three weeks, x-rays showed that I also had a break in my wrist, and by the way 15 of our family members are going to California for our 50th wedding anniversary trip!

With my back pain we allowed an extra day for our trip to Carmel, Indiana for the R.S. Prussia Convention. We brought two boxes of R.S. Prussia to show at convention and a box from C.L. Riley for the DIY Auction.

The night before the auction and my second board meeting I took a pill for pain. I woke up in the middle of the night with severe back pain and took a second pill. In the morning I woke up feeling very poorly, so I skipped breakfast and barely made it to the board meeting. The meeting was going very well, but I was very nauseous and need to go to the restroom. In the restroom I could hear the board talking about going to Grand Rapids next year. I think if I can hear them, they can hear me. The discussion is now about the following year and I am still not up to leaving the restroom. I speak up and say "I move for St. Louis". Linda Titus said it sounded like the voice of God as my voice had echoed loudly from the restroom! I realized that it wasn't exactly appropriate, but I did want to contribute to the discussion. Besides I did get a big round of laughter and I felt very relaxed among my R.S. Prussia friends.

After missing most of the DIY Auction and the first hour of the regular auction, I did venture in and get a number. As I was walking over to sit down, C.L. Riley's Black Swan plate was being sold.

My wife came back from shopping and I introduced her to Malissa. By now the auction was winding down, but I was able to go back in and buy a few more small pieces of R.S. Prussia, a Royal Saxe E.S. Indian portrait breakfast creamer and sugar, a cup and saucer with hummingbirds, and an icicle mold relish with hanging basket décor. I hope I am in better condition for next year's convention!

Final Board Meeting, Saturday, August 4, 2012 R.S.P. Convention, Renaissance Indianapolis North, Carmel, IN

President Allen DiMarco welcomed the new board members and the new vice president as well as current officers and board members to the final board meeting that convened at 8:00 a.m.

Mary Lou Bougher read the minutes of the last board meeting. A motion to Approve the minutes was made by John Imboden and 2nd by Walt Krzycki. Voted and approved.

Under old business, Allen asked if there were any concerns with convention or the hotel. No one had anything but positive comments on the total convention. Everyone felt it had been a very successful convention.

Howard Greenberg reported the Do-It-Yourself Auction raised \$2,766.00. That makes the grand total of the DIY Auction over \$53,000.00 raised in 17 years. It was noted C.L. Riley gave several items to the DIY auction. He and Lavonne have donated items that have brought in over \$3,000.00 for the auction.

Terry will not be at the banquet so he installed the new officer and board members at this meeting. Welcome to Rich Habenicht, Vice President, and Linda Gray and David Mullins new board members.

A discussion on the website was held and we found out our web hosting contract expires this year. We could continue with the same company but Allen explained the current software is not user-friendly and is causing problems with the webmaster. He felt it needs to be scrapped and we should start over. To continue with our current company, it would cost \$20.00 per month and \$80.00 per hour to make changes unless there was a drastic change which would be much more expensive. The original cost was \$2,800.00. Linda said she and her assitant could manage the website. Linda will check cost on revamping the website. It would probably be around \$1,500.00 to change it and after that \$40.00 per hour for changes. Walt Krzycki made a motion to sever ties with our current webmaster and Ken Bougher 2nd it. Voted and approved. Linda will present a proposal to Allen for revamping the website at a cost of approximately \$1500.00 and \$40.00 per hour for changes. To be updated quarterly unless we decide to do it more often. Linda Titus abstained from the vote and it was voted and approved.

Rich Habenicht made a motion that Allen makes an executive decision on the matter with parameters of approximately \$1,500. To revamp the website and \$40.00 per hour updating charge. 2nd by Arlo Stender. Voted and approved.

We had a long discussion on whether the auction should be on Friday night or on Saturday. Rich Habenicht made a motion the auction be held at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday. 2nd by Linda Gray. Voted and approved.

David Mullins questioned why officers and others receive complimentary rooms. Allen explained the club received 1 free room for each 35 nights of members staying. This varies with the hotel. Those rooms are then assigned to the President 5 nights, Vice President 5 nights, Secretary/Treasurer team 5 nights, 3 nights for Newsletter Editor, 1 night for those doing seminars, plus the free night we give away in the drawing. This is due to the fact these officers are required to be here to do their duties.

In the previous board meeting, we had decided to move the banquet to Friday night but after much consideration, Mary Lou Bougher suggested we keep it on Saturday night. A motion was made by Walt Krzycki and 2nd by Ken Bougher to keep it on Saturday night. Motion was voted on and approved.

Allen announced David Mullins and Jason Woody will do seminars next year. He thanked them for volunteering.

Allen announced that the Grand Rapids, Michigan site is now under contract. The room rate will be the same as this year, \$109 per night including free breakfast. We will only have a \$1,250 minimum to pay for the meeting and auction rooms. It will be at the Crown Plaza in Grand Rapids.

We discussed Bob McCaslin's suggestion that we cut the dues to \$25.00 per year. Mary Lou told us the newsletters and roster books cost the club more than \$50.00 per family. It would cost the club over \$6,000.00 per year to cut the dues in half. Though our treasury is in good shape, we can't afford that amount. It would empty the treasury in just a few years. Walt Krzycki made a motion we keep the dues at \$50.00 for renewals per family and \$30.00 for first time members. 2nd by Arlo Stender. Voted and motion passed.

The auction committee has talked to Jason Woody and he will do the auction in Michigan. He will limit the auction to 200 pieces as he feels additional items do not sell as well and it is not fair to the seller.

A suggestion was made of having a 5-year dues plan or even a lifetime dues plan. However it was noted some clubs have done this and it is fine for the first years but they then developed cash flow problems when no new annual dues were coming in. Motion made by Linda Gray to keep dues on an annual basis and 2nd by Linda Titus. Motion voted on and approved.

We've had requests to have mugs again. They were stopped in 2009 due to lack of interest. As a club, we decided not to peruse it but Linda Titus and another person will explore possibilities of doing a series of "Season Mugs" or another theme. It will not be done by the club.

Allen appointed Linda Titus Newsletter Editor and Mary Lou Bougher as Historian. He also appointed Bob Yaklin and Harold Dodds, Jr. to nominating committee.

Carl Tackett and Ed Smith will remain as the audit committee.

A motion to adjourn was made by Rich Habenicht and 2nd by Ken Bougher. Voted and motion carried. The meeting was adjourned.

# Prussia Points<sup>©</sup> Commemorative and Souvenir R. S. Prussia Mystify Researchers and Collectors Submitted by Allen Marcus

E xperienced R.S. Prussia collectors are often heard to say: "No matter how long I have been collecting R.S. Prussia, I always see something that I've never seen before" or similar words to that effect. The multitude of marks, molds and décor keeps both researchers and collectors on their toes, and new discoveries often pose questions as to why and when something was produced.

Some reference books show what could be called "special order pieces", which are usually elaborate items that appear to be factory-decorated with an inscription to mark a special event. On occasion, a souvenir-type item is seen that served as a memento of a particular city or tourist site. Even more puzzling are rarely seen pieces that were factory-produced to mark wedding anniversaries.

An example of a "special order" item is shown on the back cover of George and Eileen Barlock's book "The Treasures of R.S. Prussia" (published in 1976). A large tankard showing the "quiet cove" scene with swans in the foreground has a personalized inscription on the reverse side that appears to have been painted on the tankard at the R.S. factory. The



text "Margaret Thiel – Arthur Farrell, 1887 – May 19 – 1907, Compliments of the Kohlmeier Bunch" is in Old English font. Its prominence on the tankard was clearly part of the original design and included on the tankard during its manufacture, rather than the inscription having been added at a later date. Obviously, this item is oneof-a-kind.

There are also cups and saucers that were produced as tourist souvenirs. These are usually marked R.S. Suhl. Examples have appeared in reference books (see Gaston's fourth series) and on the internet that show Copenhagen (one with a Danish flag and one depicting Rosenborg Castle), and Berlin (showing the Brandenburg Gate) pictured on the cup interiors. An example of a Copenhagen/Rosenborg Castle cup was seen at the 2012 R.S. Prussia Club Convention (Photo 1). It is interesting to note that the text in the cup that identifies the castle is in Danish, rather than German.

R.S. Prussia-related Royal Vienna (RV) has produced elaborate pieces that were decorated to be sold specifically as tourist souvenirs. Photo 2 shows a 9 inch RV floral handled vase inscribed in Old English font "Washington, D. C.". Photo 3 shows a smaller 4½ inch vase, also inscribed "Washington, D. C.". These vases are quite uncommon and seldom come up for sale. If my memory serves me, there also exists souvenir-type RV vases inscribed "Atlantic City" and possibly "Niagara Falls".

Given the scarcity of these souvenir items, they were probably made for a few selected retailers on a specialorder basis, or possibly produced on a trial basis to determine if they would sell successfully. Source documents, such as contemporary retailer catalogs



and correspondence do not shed any light on these items nor tell us precisely which retailers sold them.

The rare Admiral Peary Arctic Expedition pieces are examples of commemorative items that were produced in limited quantity to celebrate the remarkable scientific quest when Admiral Robert Peary and his fellow explorers reached the geographic North Pole in 1909. This achievement had worldwide significance that was comparable to the first manned moon landing in 1969. The R.S. Prussia factory was





ahead of its time by producing this special event commemorative china, as not many china manufacturers made these types of items in the early twentieth century. In today's market, numerous china makers churn out commemorative wares on an endless basis, such as for inaugurations, royal events and sporting memorabilia.

Perhaps the most mystifying items are those that were decorated to mark wedding anniversaries. These may have been special-order items, or possibly sold on a limited basis by just one or a few retailers. With only a small number of known examples, there may be very few that survived, unless there are some still being held by family members and decedents. Thanks to the R.S. Prussia Facebook page, information on these anniversary pieces was shared by members and pieced together, inspiring this article. Photo 4 shows an unusual carnation mold cake plate marking a 25th anniversary. Photos 5 and 6 show two especially unusual



10½ inch four-portrait bowls. Each bowl's set of portraits, on gold domes, are: the two differing Lebrun portraits, Potocka and Recamier. The portraits alternate between clusters of pink roses set on gold background, and the bowl centers are deep jade-green. The mold appears to be very similar, but not exactly, to Gaston's mold 102 (see Gaston's second series, p. 54 (plate 98).

The bowl shown in Photo 5 is inscribed "50th" in gold lettering, with floral sprigs and clusters in the center, along with small gold bud-like ornaments placed between each of the domes. The similar bowl, shown in Photo 6, is inscribed "Happy Anniversary" in gold lettering. However, this bowl lacks the floral sprigs and clusters in the center area and small gold ornaments separating the domes as seen on the "50th" anniversary bowl. The text on both bowls is under the glaze, which would indicate each was decorated at the factory and not altered at a later time in order to commemorate the anniversaries that were being celebrated.

The wording used on the dish and bowl shown in Photos 4 and 6 is in a cursive-style font, which is less formal than the regal Old English font used on the Royal Vienna souvenir vases and the "50th" anniversary bowl. The four-portrait bowls (Photos 5 and 6) are unmarked and it is interesting to note that the portraits on the two bowls are not placed in the same sequence, which may imply they were not made or decorated at the same





time. To the best of my knowledge, these anniversary bowls are each unique, but we don't know that with absolute certainty.

An item that was customized to commemorate a Lewis and Clark centennial exposition was also seen at the R.S. Prussia Club's 2012 convention. A floral dish showing roses was modified to include an added log cabin and mountain background (Photo 7) and the wording, in cursive, "Forestry Building/Built of Oregon Logs/Lewis and Clark Fair/1905". Additional words were printed below in a different printed style and gold paint that read: "Portland OR/The Rose City". It is impossible to know if this modification should be considered a home-craft (amateur) decoration or a special issue that was authorized by the exposition administrators and customized by a retailer. Another RSP mystery!

These fascinating objects demonstrate that there are new discoveries and varieties to keep the R.S. Prussia hobby interesting, challenging and enjoyable. There may very well be more examples and varieties of commemorative and souvenir pieces waiting to be discovered. Members are encouraged to send any information and photos to the editor of the newsletter and help shed more light on these mysterious and intriguing pieces.





























## A Room with a Spectacular View Submitted by David Mullins

They told me they were more than happy to share photos and a story about our visit.

I brought along some recent R.S. Prussia purchases to show, my camera and laptop so that I could share my convention photos. When I arrived, I received the warmest welcome. As I walked into the dining area I could hardly believe my eyes. I'd forgotten how spectacular it is to see custommade cabinets with many shelves of R.S. Prussia. I could see portraits, scenic, cobalt, chocolate sets, cracker jars, plates and bowls in every imaginable mold. I was truly looking into a room with a spectacular view. I unpacked the R.S. Prussia I'd brought with me to show. We set the pieces on a beautiful Victorian sofa and parlor table. My friends were happy to see the pieces I brought and they pointed out some of their recent purchases. They have hosted Ohio R.S. At the round oak table we shared many R.S. Prussia stories. My friends will be celebrating their 54th wedding anniversary in November. They have



been International Club members for years. I learned that when the one friend and her older sister were young girls they use to sneak and look at beautiful dishes in a trunk that belonged to their great aunt. The sisters didn't realize it at the time, but many of these beautiful dishes were R.S. Prussia. Years later the older Sister began collecting R.S. Prussia. They now collect all types of Prussia and have one of the largest varieties of pieces I have ever seen.

I brought my laptop to the table. I showed them the photos I took at convention. We talked about many of the purchases we've made over the years and reminisced about old friends. We remembered Tony and Jenny Vouckovich who sold my friends a Keyhole Winter Season chocolate pot and a Tiffany Lily mold Lebrun coffee pot. 

I told him I was still happy about the sale but I felt that someone overpaid for item #7.


