Jim Norman Antiques on Main Street East is full of exquisite antiques making this stop extremely enjoyable. We both were so excited we walked right on by those vases, knowing we couldn't afford to buy them. It was difficult to even look around anymore but we found a stunning Icicle mold reflecting flowers 11" bowl. So we went back and talked to Dot Gilley, the shop manager. First Board Meeting, Thursday, July 24, 2014

The first board meeting of the International Association of R.S. Prussia Collectors, Inc. met Thursday, July 24, 2014 at 11:00 a.m. Allen DiMarco called the meeting to order with 11 board members plus Col. Bob Yaklin as Nomination Committee Chairman present.

Secretary Mary Lou Bougher read the minutes of the last board meeting in July, 2013. Allen called for any corrections or additions to the minutes and hearing none; called for a vote to approve the minutes. A motion was made by Walt Krzycki and seconded by Judy Bazaar to approve the minutes. The motion carried.

Ken Bougher, Treasurer gave a report of the June 1, 2013 to May 31, 2014 fiscal year. A call was made by Allen DiMarco for any questions, additions or corrections to the Treasurer's report. Hearing none, Linda Gray made a motion the minutes be approved and second by Walt Krzycki. Vote was taken and Treasurer's Report was approved.

Under old business, Walt Krzycki said he had sent letters to lapsed members but got little response and that we would be better served to go through Facebook to increase membership.

Linda Titus said the website had been updated and she was waiting for a decision on what to include in the members only page before that was included.

Allen reaffirmed that the Facebook page is a separate entity from the International Club and we had no responsibility to how it was run or anything coming from it.

David Mullins reported there are 538 members on the Facebook page with all of us wishing they all would join the International Club.

Allen reported of problems with

the tables at the hotel. They were only going to provide 18" tables instead of 30" tables. Allen told the manager he would have to handle it as we could not have split tables to display our RS Prussia as it was too valuable.

Linda Titus reported she has been able to hold down the costs of the newsletter though paper prices have skyrocketed. But due to the lower number of members to print copies for, the price has held steady.

Nominating Committee Chairman Bob Yaklin reported he had good response from members volunteering to run for the various offices. For President, Allen Marcus, Vice-President Beth VanderMeer, Secretary Linda Titus, Treasurer Christine Monteiro, and Board Members Linda Gray and David Mullins for a second term and Pete Weimer had all volunteered to run. We still need a 4th board member. That may come from nominations from the floor.

Mary Lou Bougher, Secretary gave the State of the Union report and noted we have 241 members. Two of those are new at convention.

Allen told us that Allen Marcus had purchased a projector for the Club and he had been reimbursed by the Treasurer.

The 2015 convention will again be held at the Cincinnati Marriott Northwest with a room rate of \$109 per night plus tax.

Under New Business, Mary Lou gave the convention report of 55 pre-registered and 73 rooms reserved. We have had 10 register at the convention with two of those new members. We have 52 reservations for the banquet with a final cut-off at the Business Meeting.

On convention activities; Allen announced Lynnea Strong volunteered to be in charge of the hospitality room,

but could use some more volunteers to man the room.

Allen said we were unable to have banquet entertainment as there was no one close enough to find entertainment for us. Professional entertainment is also getting too expensive for the club to afford. Linda Titus suggested we look to some of our members who have talent to fill this gap. We also had a similar problem on arranging a barbeque for this year as there was no one in St Louis to arrange it.

Allen reported we have members on floors 1,3,4,5 and 6.

Allen told of the problem of no tables for the auction. The tables will cost \$400.00. We are not sure if Woody Auction Company will pick up the charge or the club will have to absorb it.

Alan explained the importance of the banquet. The price of meals before tax and gratuity goes toward the minimum food and drink requirement that pays for all the rooms we use for the meeting and auction. We were unusually lucky this year as there was no minimum. If we don't meet the minimum, we are fined several thousand dollars as we were several years ago.

On the 2016 convention, a vote was taken to defer a decision on the location of it until the new board meets and they would make that decision.

Allen announced Ryzard Wittke from Poland would be giving a presentation in a seminar. We needed a translator and a Polish Priest from the Polish Catholic Church in St. Louis was asked to translate. We voted to give him a \$200.00 stipend as that is what the professional group we contacted was going to charge. They had cancelled so we contacted the Priest. David Mullins made the motion

the club pay for the \$200.00. Walt Krzycki seconded it. Vote was taken and motion carried. Ken Bougher suggested David ask the members for donations to cover the cost for the club. Second by Mary Lou Bougher. Motion approved. Mary Lou Bougher reported the club computer had quit while she was typing reports. She took it to Best Buy to check the battery and plug, but they were ok. Best Buy told her they checked and the motherboard

was dead. A new motherboard would cost about \$130.00 plus the cost to install it. The computer man Mary Lou uses said it would be wiser to put the money toward a new computer. We decided to let the new Secretary and Board make the decision as to whether to fix the old one, use her personal computer, or buy a new one.

Allen suggested we have the induction of new officers at the Business Meeting as soon as the

election results are final. This would eliminate the problem of some new officers having to leave and missing the installation. Decision was made to do this as there is nothing in our by-laws stipulating when it is to be done.

Arlo Stender made a motion we adjourn and was seconded by Judy Bazaar. Voted and approved. Meeting was adjourned.

What a Great Do It Yourself Auction!

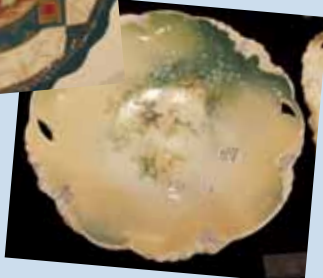

R.S. Prussia to Relish Submitted by Arlo Stender

I am back from St. Louis and reflecting on the good time we had at the R.S. Prussia Convention. It was great to be there with my grandson and to have no broken bones this year.

Years ago, when I had been collecting R.S. Prussia for only a few months, two fellow antique collector friends stopped in. They came to see my very small collection of Prussia. One of them asked me if I only collected bowls. I told him no, but that was mostly what I had been finding. Since that time I have made a conscious effort to diversify. It has worked well for me as I like all Schlegelmilch china, including the early pieces, R.S. Prussia, R.S. Germany, and E.S. My collection still has a lot of bowls.

Trays (especially the smaller ones), toothpick holders, syrup pitchers with underplates, creamer and sugar sets, cups and saucers, and small berry bowls can be displayed in front of pots, tankards, bowls and cake plates. Trays are found in an assortment of molds and decorations.

Here are some examples. The first two (photos 1 and 2) are medallion mold relish trays. They are 9 3/4" long by 4 3/4" wide. One has the runner duck décor. The second has cobalt with Colonial People portraits in the four medallions; three are portraits of men and one is a lady. R.S. Prussia has many more

portraits of women than men.

Trays three and four are Carnation mold and are 9 1/4" long by 4 1/4" wide. One of these two has roses as the center décor while the other is cobalt with carnation décor.

Photos 5 and 6 are of trays in the Icicle mold. Photo 5 is another relish tray. It is 9 5/8" long by 4 1/2" wide and has peacock décor. The tray in photo 6 is and is an olive tray and has the hanging basket décor. It is only 8" long by 3 7/8" wide. The last relish tray (photo 7) has the Castle scene décor in the brown tones and is 9 3/8" long by 4 1/2" wide.

The next two (photos 8 and 9) are celery trays. The one with fruit (photo 8) is 12 1/4" long by 6" wide and has a scalloped border. The other tray (photo 9) is 11" long and 5 1/2" wide with a wide gold border. It is double marked with the R.S. Germany wreath and star in blue and it has Reinhold Schlegelmilch, Tillowitz in script with the capital letters GERMANY underneath in red.

The last tray (photo 10) is a 12 1/2" long by 8 1/2" wide bun tray. It is cobalt in the Carnation mold with the carnation decoration. As far as I know, it is the only one like it with the open handles.

To conclude, the late Frank Finn once gave me a place card that says, "It is hard to be humble when you have R.S. Prussia."

The laptop computer was passed from Mary Lou Bougher to new secretary Linda Titus. It is in need of a new mother board. Discussion was held concerning the repairs. David Mullins

said that his partner David Buckner works on computers and could look at it. Christine moved to have David Buckner look at it and assess the damage with assessment fee not to exceed \$50. Second by Allen DiMarco. Motion carried.

(Follow-up item: David Mullins departed from convention before the laptop could be given to him; President Allen then directed Linda Titus to use her judgment in having the laptop diagnosed and repaired if economically advantageous - not to exceed \$200.)

Secretary minutes submitted by Mary Lou Bougher from the previous board meeting held Thursday, July 24, 2014 were read by Linda Titus. A motion was made by Christine to approve the minutes after corrections. Second by Linda Gray and the motion was carried.

President Allen introduced Heather Wiskow to the board and appointed her as Editor and Webmaster. Section D of Article 8 of the by-laws was read by Linda Titus, pointing out that appointment must have the approval of the board. A motion was made by Walt K. and 2nd by Christine to approve the appointment of Heather Wiskow as Editor and Webmaster. The motion carried. The Editor position runs the entire term of the President.

The website domain password was the topic of the next discussion. President Allen appointed Allen D. to ask Leslie Schultz for the password. President Allen gave the directive for the President, V.P. and the Webmaster to have access to the password.

The club website updates were discussed. A question about the links for the Q&A section was made. Heather is to leave the email addresses of Joeleen Passow, Rich Habenicht, and Harold Dodds, Jr. President Allen asked for the period of performance contract of the website be drawn up for 3 year period since the date it went into effect. The contract will be clarified to show the effective period.

This process consists of a matrix with a weighted guideline method. It became moot when the limits on auctioneers performing in various states became problematic.

Hotel comp rooms were discussed and Christine will review the cost of the club. V.P. Beth made a motion that Christine report to the board her findings on comp rooms. Second by Allen DiMarco. Motion carried.

David Mullins volunteered to research other collector clubs so that the board can make informed decisions on dues and newsletters.

A motion was made by Arlo and second by Linda Titus to adjourn. Motion carried.
