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L have been a member of the club for many years, but have yet to be able to attend a convention or meet a fellow member in person. I am hoping some of you will send me an e-mail message and perhaps we can start a correspondence. My information can be found in our directory.

When I first started collecting I did so for the pure beauty of the porcelain. I found that wherever I went searching for treasures, I always ended up picking up a lovely piece of porcelain and it usually was covered in pretty florals. One day while poking around in an out-of-the-way antique shop, a very helpful dealer asked me what I was looking for, etc. and a little later she brought forth a few of the books about RS Prussia and that began my love affair with this magnificent and intriguing porcelain. I soon purchased every book I could find and when I started researching my own items I was amazed to find that most of the pieces I had already picked up were actually RS. Lucky for me, I was able to start searching for items on eBay in the early days and my collection continues to grow until today and now it totals several hundred pieces.

I would like to share with you some photos of a set I have that I am most proud of. It required many years of searching and buying to accumulate this many items, but it has been well worth the effort as it is one of the highlights of my collection today. I have been amazed at the different sizes of items RS produced within the set. When I first started out I thought that if I had one large bowl or berry set, I had it covered. I was very wrong as I soon learned that there are several different sizes of the larger bowls in this set. The gradation of sizes continued in the oval vegetable servers as well as the plates and there

may be more I haven't found yet. There are both the biscuit jar and cracker jar as well (I now know the difference thanks to Allen Marcus's discussion of this item in our March newsletter). I continue to look for the covered butter dish, the pancake server and 5 more coffee cup and saucer sets. I would so appreciate hearing from anyone who has other items that I'm not aware of in this mold and pattern. I am still missing three more of the 8" plates and then I will be able to complete the luncheon serving set.

Being a collector on the West Coast has both its advantages and disadvantages. The advantages are that there are not many others who are searching our antique shops and out-of-the-way junk shops for RS, but the disadvantages are, that there are not many who I can share the joy of collecting with or who have an interest in seeing my own collection, so I have missed out on the social aspect of collecting that many of you back east continue to enjoy.

My husband passed away two years ago and though we had always hoped to make it to a convention one day, that didn't happen. Maybe I will be able to make the trip someday, even if I make it alone, as I would enjoy greatly, meeting others who have the same love and passion for collecting this wonderful treasure of a bygone era. Many of you have been generous with helping me when I've had questions about a piece and I would love to say thank you again to Ron Capers and Lee Marples for the times you shared your thoughts and insights with me. It goes without saying that the great investment of time and energy that some have put into producing books so that we may have information available to us, is invaluable and if I never have the pleasure of meeting any



of you, I extend my sincere gratitude for your efforts. My collecting wouldn't have been the same without the guidance.

As a collector who really loves this porcelain as you do, the only regrets I may have are the items I sold and traded in my earlier collecting days, always thinking I could replace them someday with something similar only to discover that in many cases I couldn't. The few items that I did sell, I continue to miss and wonder if the person who has them loves them as much as I did. If I had it to do again... there are a few that I wouldn't have let go, but such is the learning experience, isn't it?

One final note which I hope will be helpful, especially to the new collectors. Early in my collecting days, I would wait anxiously for a delivery from UPS when I was

expecting a new piece. One very cold December day, a package was delivered and I was so excited to see it that I unpacked it immediately and took it to the sink to begin cleaning it. To my dismay, the warm water from the tap, flowing over the cold porcelain glaze caused the glaze to shatter and there I was holding this gorgeous bowl that had just been ruined. I cried for having been so utterly stupid, but the damage was done and there was no undoing it. I keep that piece as a constant reminder when handling antiques... let them warm to room temperature before cleaning or handling them and this is one rule I follow even when the weather is warmer.

Best regards to all of you and I hope to hear from or meet with some of you one day. ★



Why I Attend Our Conventions

t was in early spring and I believe the year was 1999.

Ralph Schlegelmilch had suggested to my wife, Gay, and me that we should consider attending the RS Prussia Convention. That year the convention was being held in Novi, Michigan. We had talked about doing the trip, but frankly, had known no other club members but Ralph and Eunice and honestly were somewhat intimidated of attending a world convention "on our own."

Unfortunately, when returning from my son's wedding in Clarksville, TN, earlier that summer, my father shared with Gay and me that he had developed severe pain in his upper thigh area and asked if we would accompany him to his doctor's appointment later that week. Obviously we agreed and numerous tests and consultations later we learned that my father had lymphoma. The prognosis was concerning, but the medical team felt that with proper treatment he would be ok.

As it happened, my father had a brother and a sister that lived in the Detroit area. Gay and I thought it might be a good idea to encourage him to arrange a visit—not knowing the outcome of the scheduled treatments. In retrospect, it was a good idea. That was the last time the three siblings were together. My aunt, who lived in Livonia, was only about a 20-minute drive to Novi. So, why not visit my relatives and attend the R. S. Prussia Convention too? The plans were finalized and we decided to stay at my aunt's and commute to the convention.

What a marvelous time we had! In fact, we haven't missed a convention since our first visit. Why have we returned? What made our visit so special?

The answer to the above two questions is very simple — the members! At first, we were like leaderless geese. We had no idea what to do, how the room displays worked, what the seminar topics were, and how important it was to be at the convention and to stay at the hotel.

Our colored badge identified us as first-time attendees. Soon after arriving and moving through the Registration Desk, we encountered three pairs of angels: First we were greeted, welcomed, and introduced to George Kandel. He sat with us and explained the protocol and the do's and don'ts of room visitations and how the format of the planned activities of the three days were organized. George checked back with us at least three times that first day to answer questions and to be sure we were comfortable and to introduce us to many of the members in the rooms, hallways, and at the hospitality room. When George wasn't

Club members would walk the floors hoping that this was the year someone had brought that fourth plate they needed to complete their set or that sixth cup and saucer they so desperately wanted. Members like Danny Chandler and Paul Fischer and the late Joyce Williams put on outstanding room displays year after year and continued to help make the each convention special.





Unfortunately, over the past 10 years the number of people who bring things to sell and display has steadily declined. Without people bringing R.S. Prussia to sell and share the hallways are just a bunch of closed doors, free of flags and all signs of life. Back in the day, the convention was the place that you would bring all the best stuff you had found over the course of the year to sell to the biggest group of R.S. Prussia enthusiasts under one roof anywhere. Room-to-room viewing on Saturday was quite an event and rooms were packed shoulder to shoulder with club members seeing what the sellers had to offer and to see if the piece they wanted was still there. Selling at the convention was the reason my dad and I would pound the pavement at antique shows and shops over the course of the year hoping to gather enough good Prussia to make for a decent room display.

Today, with eBay and other auction sites available, people have additional outlets where they can reach far more people to sell their R.S. Prussia and therefore don't bring it to the convention to sell anymore. Other people feel they will be tied down to selling in their rooms and miss out









on all of the other activities. You are not obligated to sell from 9 to 5 every day in your room. You are free to sell during the hours you want to sell and make the most of your convention experience. I have had more fun essentially selling and letting the convention come to me in my own room than almost anything else. I have been introduced to many members for the first time when they came into my room to view. Your room becomes a meeting place for conversation over those three or four days. Since you're going to be at the convention anyway why not bring a few pieces to sell and at least cover the cost of your room? Whether you bring 10 pieces or 100 pieces, selling from your room is a fundamental part of the R.S. Prussia Convention experience. I hope all who attend the 2009 Convention will participate. 🖈
